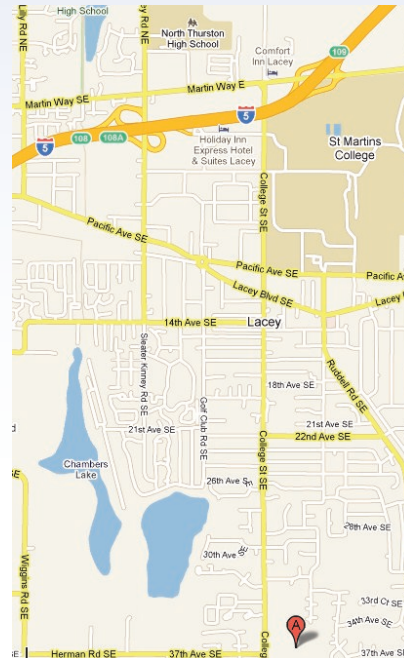

About the Turners



David Ellsworth, Quakertown, PA

David's first exposure to woodturning began in 1958, when he was fourteen. By the time he received his Master's degree in sculpture in 1973, David had worked in many

media including metal, fiber and polyester. But it was his experience working in clay that led him to consider the intimate power of the vessel form. His love for the material of wood returned and by the mid-1975, he had developed a series of tools that allowed him to produce thin-walled hollow forms through a process called 'blind turning'.

"My intent as an artist is to translate thought into form and to create singular statements that evolve through the integration of the material of wood with the process of turning. I prefer to work in series where I can explore ideas, challenge concepts and expand the dimension of my work into a broad visual language. I consider the skill of my craft to be the foundation from which my artwork has evolved, and that the identity of each object is a glimmer of the collective body of my life's work."

Jim is a retired architect from San Diego, CA where he had his own firm and was engaged in the design of hospitals and large retail buildings. He has been a lifelong woodworker having designed and built furniture and children's toys, been a woodcarver for 30+ years and has been a passionate woodturner for more than twenty years. Although he has turned thousands of bowls and done hundreds art pieces, he has maintained a steady business doing custom architectural spindleware including newel posts,

railing spindles, building finials for contractors and restorers. He has also turned spindles for clock-case restorers, weaving accessory suppliers and furniture makers/restorers. Jim, is a former member of the San Diego Woodturners, is a current member of the Olympic Peninsula Woodturners and the American Association of Woodturners.

Primer on Spindle Turning—Basic Cuts

Jim will review and demonstrate basic spindle cuts, discussing spindle design vocabulary, demonstrate his approach to copy work while demonstrating some spindle turning projects.

Cut-rimmed Salad Bowl from 1/2 Log
